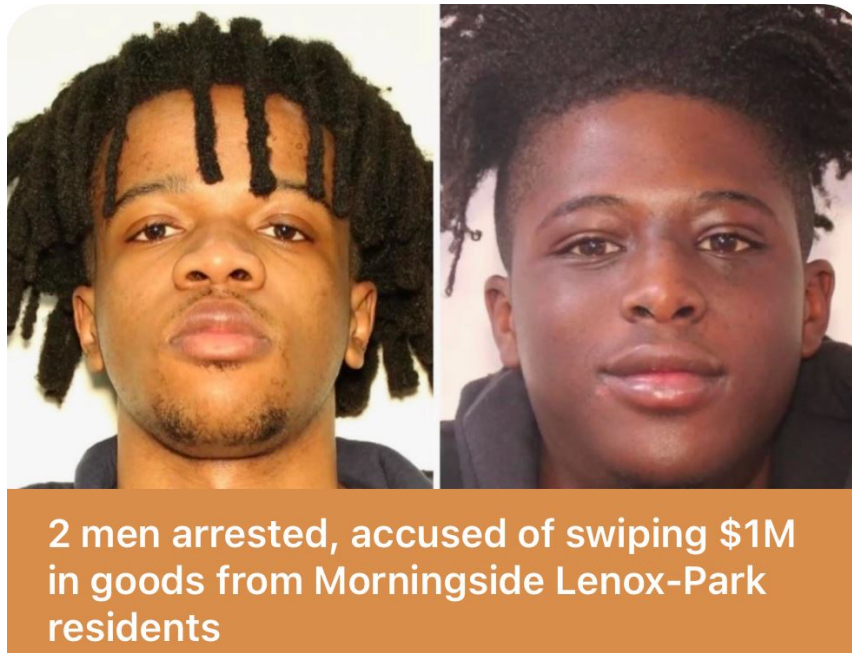

Additional Information on Recent Burglary Arrests

[2 men arrested, accused of swiping \\$1M in goods from Morningside Lenox-Park residents](#)

The information in this article comes from interviews conducted by FOX 5 Atlanta reporter Eric Mock and his previous reporting on the subject matter from July 2024.

The Atlanta Police Department is calling the arrests of two suspects believed to be responsible for the [string of burglaries in the Morningside Lenox-Park neighborhood](#) a "major win."

APD released body cam video of the arrests of Aurelius Brown and Tiger Hollingsworth on Thursday.

"As a unit and as a department, it's a major win," said Lt. Damian Crowder with APD's Burglary Unit.

We first reported to you in July that burglars were targeting homes in Morningside Lenox-park.

Neighbors there shared surveillance video of a burglar going through their homes while they were on vacation, always with the same outfit and M.O.

More than a dozen homes there were hit this year.

"They took some collector cards, some safes, some handguns and some high-end watches and some high-end jewelry as well," Crowder said.

However, Crowder says they were able to recover a lot of the stolen items at the residence where they found Hollingsworth and Brown.

Investigators say Hollingsworth is the primary suspect and Brown is another suspect in a string of burglaries that have kept neighbors in the Morningside Lenox-park neighborhood awake at night for months.

"We did recover several safes. We did recover several handguns. We did recover some cards and some collected coins, and that's just to name a few things that we actually recovered," Crowder said. "We're still going through all of the pieces that were actually taken from the location where we apprehended the suspect. But, we're thinking that it is in the ballpark of \$1,000,000-plus."

Investigators have charged Hollingsworth with four burglaries in the neighborhood so far, but they're not ruling out more.

"It is still ongoing, and there's still more that they're going to be linked to," Crowder said.

Neighbors tell FOX 5 they pushed the police department to keep up the investigation and even held community meetings with investigators.

Crowder says the cooperation from the Morningside Lenox-park neighbors was critical to these arrests.

"The Morningside community was a really, really big help. [They were] very engaged during the operation. Anything that we needed, any video that they could come up with, it was always sent to us and that was a huge part of it," Crowder said.

Lt. Crowder says this is a good reminder of how important surveillance video can be and to make sure yours is working properly.

"If you have video surveillance at your house, make sure that it's actually working, and know what type of system you have. Know if your system is a live feed and if your system is one that actually records," he said.

Greenspace Steward Greta Woods

We are happy to introduce one of our newer neighbor-volunteers, Greta Woods, an environmental scientist and mom who has been exploring our local nature preserves and bringing her enthusiasm and expertise to Friends of Herbert Taylor Park.

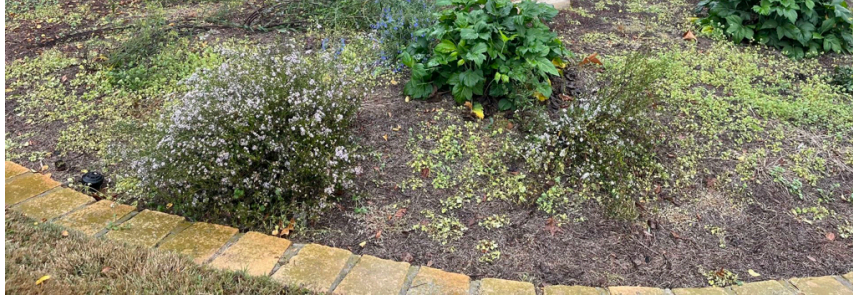
Greta has spent her career in environmental consulting, most recently in Environmental, Social, and Governance (ESG) due diligence/transaction advisory. She and her husband Spencer moved to Morningside in 2021 with their almost five-year-old future MES Dolphin.

Greta has enjoyed Herbert Taylor Park for years and grew curious about the work of the Friends group. After seeing signs advertising workdays in the park, she reached out to MLPA and has since been a regular at the workdays, gaining an appreciation for the group's hard work and dedication and learning all about the old growth forest's native flora and history as a Muscogee settlement. Her original reluctance of bringing a five-year-old park enthusiast to workday was assuaged by the Friends group's welcoming him and ability to put him to work with small tasks.

Almost as exciting as joining a Friends of Park group is graduating with the second cohort of Park Pride's Park Stewardship Academy (PSA), a twelve-week course covering all aspects of park stewardship intended to train up an army of uber-volunteers to augment Park Pride's work with local communities and greenspaces. Greta reports that her favorite PSA sessions were led by the naturalists at Mason Mill and Arabia Mountain. "While touring their parks, they told us about the various park programs they've offered through the years which really inspired me and got me thinking about ways we can engage a wider group of neighbors to enjoy our neighborhood nature preserves. I would love to help bring more environmental education opportunities to the forest, maybe work with the nearby schools for field trips, explore ways to incorporate more nature-based art, various naturalist programs, workshops with the Scouts, a botanical sketch class, a night of music in the forest, or installation of a story walk that would be updated quarterly in partnership with the library system. Lots of ideas, but most importantly I'm looking forward to engaging with neighbors to learn how they would like to use and enjoy the park." As a PSA graduate, she is entitled to a small grant with which she can help activate the park. We can't wait to see her visions become reality!

Asked what changes she would like to see in Morningside parks, "My hope is that more people will fall in love with our neighborhood's parks. I hope the forest will serve more people as a place of peace, wonder, and beauty. I hope more neighbors will be inspired by the nature preserve to do what they can in their own yards to support wildlife such as landscaping with a variety of plants native to our region, leaving the leaves instead of removing them, and not using pesticides. We can all take small actions to help keep Atlanta not only A City in the Forest, but a forest that is alive and well."





Smith Park Cleans Up Nicely

Smith Park - at the corner of Piedmont and Monroe - is an unofficial entryway to the neighborhood, thus demanding a presentable appearance for our visitors. In 2024, we continued to clean up this classic gem. Pressure washing, plant cleanup and new plantings have brought life to this highly visible park.

The secret to working with the City often lies in diligence and repeated communications (harassment?), which finally culminated in the removal of our last two dead trees and approval by the Parks Design Committee for the native plantings.

In November we completed the second round of putting native plants from Beech Hollow Farms into the ground, thanks to a Community Improvement Grant through NPU-F. This installment included a dozen species, specifically swamp azalea, spicebush, native strawberry, and blue-eyed grass. This fall's mini-drought didn't help conditions, but we will keep this native garden alive in the following years, for the joy of all pollinators and passersby.

We are Not Done Yet!

Hello from Friends of Sidney Marcus Park. By now you have seen the progress of our Moving Atlanta Forward bond from 2022. It may look like it is finished, but our contractor is taking a break as they wait on a several items.

New Picnic Area on the Knoll

We have named the hill at the park the “Knoll” and as part of this renovation, we are establishing a new gathering and picnic area at its top. What you don't see is two new picnic tables that

a new gathering and picnic area at its top. What you don't see is two new picnic tables that match the ones we added next to the playscape. They are on order and should be here soon. You will also see the unfortunate accident that knocked down the light post next to the new picnic area. It will be replaced once our contractor can find the right replacement.

New Entrance at Cumberland Circle

While it is not a stately entrance at the park, this new entrance will bring visitors into the park from Cumberland Circle and for the first time, we have a new path into the park through the knoll area. What you don't see yet is a new park sign that will be added at the new entrance.

The Playscape

A big part of this renovation is the repair of the playscape surface and a new drainage system that will eliminate the mud and pond that collects at the bottom of the playscape. This work is yet to be done.

New Bike Rack

We have had many requests for a bike rack and we will be finally adding one at the Cumberland Road entrance.

New Water Connection at the Sherwood Entrance

FSMP is working to keep the lower area green through aeration, seeding and watering. We have had a temporary watering system for the lower level, but we are adding a water connection near the Sherwood Road entrance. From there, FSMP will be building out a more permanent and efficient irrigation system for the lower area.

Surprise Tribute Swing to be Installed at the Park

Thanks to a longtime neighbor and donor, we will be adding a swing that will match the one that was added during the lower park area renovation from 2021. It will be installed on the knoll facing the playscape. We will have more details about this terrific new addition to the park as we get closer to building it. We gained approval from the city for this addition and will be working to get it added while we are in this construction phase at the park. And we will highlight our terrific park neighbor and benefactor.

New Artist at the Park

In 2024 we launched an Art at the Park program to use our beautiful information kiosk to showcase Morningside artists. Our first artist was Mike Phillips and his Morningside Art (morningsideartatl.com) studio. In October, we launched our second artist showcase and display with Mical Liske. Please check her work out at the information kiosk at the Cumberland Road entrance.

Sunken Garden Park

Thanks to the infrastructure bond that was passed in 2022 for Renew Atlanta, Sunken Garden Park also received funds to install some much-needed capital improvement projects. Patrick Hand, from Integrated Land Design, submitted the plans with input from the Friends of the Park group, and Lichty Construction is the approved vendor for the work. The focus of efforts is to improve safety, access and drainage:

- New "landing pad" on Plymouth to create point of entry/detract from entering via high-traffic E Rock Springs
- New ADA ramp will improve access + create more visibility when that brush is all cleaned up
- The steep rocky stairs in the middle of W Sussex will be removed
- Access stairs at E Rock Springs/E Sussex and alongside the vehicle ramp will get handrails to improve safety and be cleaned up generally
- Expanded raised mulch pads for playground equipment will improve drainage and provide more space for future installments
- Some of the lower brush along E Rock Springs will be cleaned up for visibility
- There will be some funds for landscaping, new benches, power-washing the playground equipment, etc.

We look forward to the anticipated progress!

Friends of Herbert Tavior and Daniel Johnson



If you have visited the beach at Herbert Taylor Park where Rock Creek flows into South Fork Peachtree Creek, you may have noticed that there's more light getting to the ground and new plants have been placed.

This, and all the other improvements you may see, are thanks to the hundreds of volunteers who have made a difference in our parks this year. In November, our partnerships with Hands on Atlanta and Emory Cares paid dividends as a number of new volunteers worked with us. Thanks to Georgia Tech's Society of Asian Scientists and Engineers (SASE) and the Emory alumni/post grads. They helped us plant blueberries (*Vaccinium arboreum*, *V. corymbosum*, and *V. ellioti*), ferns (*Polystichum arcrostichoides*), grasses (*Juncus effusus*), and big leaf magnolia (*Magnolia macrophylla*). These plants were acquired with a grant from the City of Atlanta Planning Dept. disbursed by NPU-F. In the next few months, you will spot a number of new plantings—please make sure your animals are on leash and that you stay on the trails to give them a chance to grow. Our intent is to promote a 'food forest for wildlife' that will replace the privet, ivy, and other invasives our volunteers have removed.

Working in the park is a great way to learn about plants and wildlife, work up some sweat, and make new friends.

- Monday, January 20, 9am - 12pm, MLK Day of Service and Weed Wrangle at Herbert Taylor Park

Both days are led by park volunteers, the experts in restoration, so no experience is required. Either or both dates are an excellent chance to earn service hours for students, scouting, or just to have some fun outside. There will be snacks and other treats for volunteers.

Wear long sleeves, pants, and close toed shoes for protection. Bring your favorite gardening gloves and tools or borrow some of ours. Come learn to use a weed wrench for a real power trip!

Morningside Nature Preserve

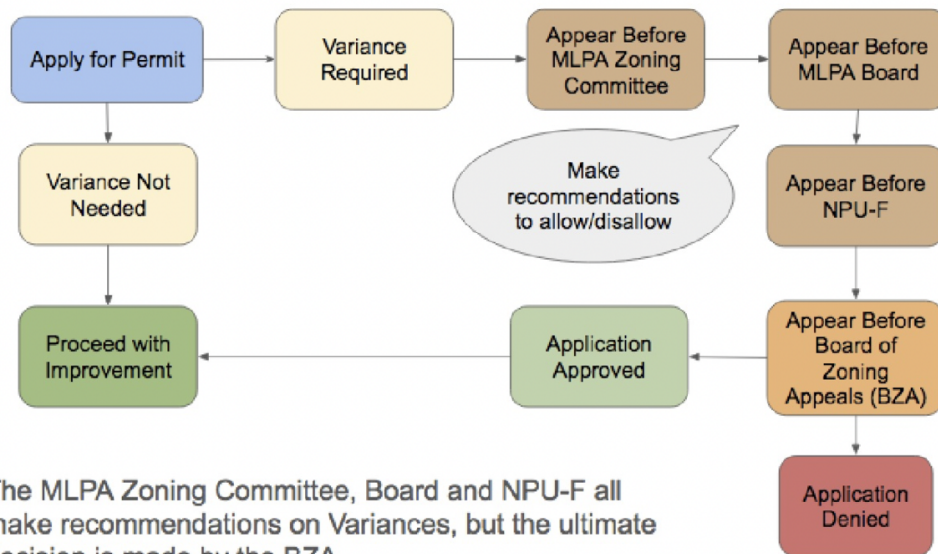

We hope to see you at our next one featuring the **Transportation Planning Chapter on Monday, December 16 at Plywood Place, 933 Lee St SW b1, Atlanta, GA 30310**. Doors open at 5:30PM with the panel starting around 6:15PM.

Below are highlights of upcoming milestones in the planning process.

January 10 – Post Draft #3 with the draft Community Work Program and Report of Accomplishments, and intermediate revisions based on recently collected public input.

January 31 – Close Review and Comment on the draft Development Pattern Map.

February 6 – Final Community Meeting.

February 28 – Close Review and Comment on the draft Chapters.

February 28 – Final day to have a *Conversation with Planners*.

Late-March – Submit Draft #4 to the State and Atlanta Regional Commission.

March to June – Present at NPU Monthly meetings and NPUs vote.

Early July – Adopt Final Draft based on State, ARC, NPU, and Council input.
